# IWF Detroit 2020 Global Conference

**Message from Co-Chairs Mary Kramer** and Fave Nelson

#### Overview



The Michigan IWF chapter will welcome hundreds of IWF members from around the globe to the Motor City, **Oct. 7-9, 2020!** While there will be a lot of work associated with planning a first-class

conference, we look forward to engaging <u>all</u> of you in what will be an exciting journey as we prepare to host our first ever conference in Detroit. We have had a number of discussions with the National IWF office concerning overall planning; while all of what we do and how we do it has to ultimately be approved /coordinated with National,

they have been tremendously helpful and have provided great advice and counsel as we step into this space (e.g. do not start conference planning too early to ensure that individuals/groups will have assigned task with nothing to do). We are developing a detailed timeline (based upon great info provided by Houston 2017 and Toronto 2019) that we look to complete in October with more to come on this topic. The following represents work that has been completed to date.

# Theme/Redefining Reinvention: From Industrial to Urban Revolution

This is the theme we used in our original "pitch" to IWF, but the language will be refined and shortened to something more like: "The Modern Global City." While the content of the programming will be GLOBAL, not simply Detroit-centric, our experience here in Detroit will be woven throughout the event. Speakers will include women from around the globe, but the Michigan chapter can also recommend local speakers for various program segments.

# **Early Work Required in Committee Planning Process**

For your information, the timeline provided by IWF asks that we identify Behind the Scenes (BTS) locations by Q4, 2019 but other chapters have recommended that we use our regular IWF meetings to vet BTS locations as much as possible! So as we reflect on the "best of the best" in our community, we encourage you to start thinking about Behind the Scenes as we prepare to have these discussions at our upcoming meetings. Note that our original bid to IWF included these types of experiences:

- Street art the Graffiti/Murals project in Eastern Market
- Pewabic Tile, founded by artistic entrepreneur Mary Chase Stratton
- Neighborhood housing (a lot going on in neighborhood revitalization, shipping containers, etc)
- The Arab-American experience (the museum? Heritage?)

So, Nancy and Carolyn ignored the well-intentioned advice and launched The Belle Michigan Impact Fund in March 2018 to address the underserved, early-stage, capital need of womenowned and led companies.
